Module Summary

This module introduces students to the real-world dynamics of the planning process in England, through a critical review of the prescribed stages of plan-making and decision-taking at a full range of strategic levels and spatial contexts. A central focus here will be the role of Statutory Development Plans (SDPs), and their integral components, Local and Neighbourhood Plans. Consideration will be given to how a full range of cross-sector stakeholders come to define an agreed spatial vision for their areas and determine individual development proposals in relation to that vision, as well as the practical and ethical qualities required of the different players in the planning process. Students will be encouraged to recognise conflicts that arise in the delivery of sustainable development and how effective leadership can help to ameliorate the process.

Module Aims

This module aims to enable students to:

- Progress a knowledge and critical understanding of how the regulatory frameworks of the planning system operate in practice across a range of strategic levels and geographic locations;
- Develop an ability to navigate the UK's constantly changing planning framework and to identify the appropriate level and focus for applying policies in a manner that best promotes sustainable development;
- Foster a recognition of, and critically analyse, the main policy responses to current and emerging planning issues, in order to present appropriate, place-specific solutions; and
- Explore how concepts of effective leadership and management of organisations, people, and projects are applied to the planning system, and evaluate which approaches are most appropriate in a range of different contexts.

Module Learning Outcomes

- To demonstrate critical comprehension of the principles and processes involved in spatial planning policy and the way it can be used to create a vision to deliver sustainable development, infrastructure provision, regeneration, urban design and placemaking for communities.
- LO1. To identify and appraise the wide-ranging issues, interrelationships and professional competencies that promote sustainable development and that underscore the design and delivery of Statutory Development Plans (SDPs).
- LO2. To appraise the statutory and extra-statutory practices and procedures for determining planning applications, including stakeholder consultations, enforcement and appeals, and demonstrate an understanding of the related, necessary professionalism and ethical approaches.
- LO3. To critically analyse the spatial planning factors that influence management, strategic decision-making and leadership within the context for delivering sustainable development by and for sustainable communities.

Indicative Module Content

Module topics

Spatial Planning Challenges

A consideration of the conflicts facing planners when trying to deliver sustainable development in diverse social, economic and environmental contexts; the role of spatial planning in managing development pressures while protecting the built and natural environment; exploring different planning responses to address and reconcile these competing interests.

An Introduction to statutory plan-making

A critical overview of plan-making procedures at the national, regional and local levels in the UK at a time of rapid change - e.g., the National Planning Policy Framework; National Policy Statements; Statutory Development Plans, comprising Local and Neighbourhood Plans; Supplementary Planning Documents; and other

forms of official planning guidance, drawing on a wide range of representative case studies.

- An introduction to the principles and practice of development management Procedures for making and determining planning applications; permitted development; planning appeals; planning enforcement; the role of HM Planning Inspectorate and the courts; and a consideration of the necessary related skills and inputs of the various stakeholders, drawing on a wide range of representative case studies.
- A developer-focused approach to planning conditions and planning gain Assessing how and why the planning system imposes conditions on planning approvals and regimes for developers to make financial or in-kind contributions to mitigate the impacts of developments; and the rights and duties of developers in such circumstances. Critically evaluating the scope of developers to negotiate solutions that maximise viability, while conforming to the principle of sustainable development.
- Stakeholder engagement and management in the planning process Exploring the concepts, statutory requirements and practice of stakeholder engagement and management from a developer's, consultee's and decision maker's point of view; methods for mapping out and proactively engaging with stakeholders, leveraging, and managing their input; and meeting the challenge of building consensus in a planning and development context.

This content will be reviewed and updated regularly to reflect the legal, moral, and financial changes in professional standards and practice.
